Pupil Premium Report 2014-2015

The Government introduced the Pupil Premium Grant in April 2011. This grant is additional to main school funding and is seen by the government as the best way to address the current underlying inequalities between children eligible for free school meals (FSM) and those who are not. Children who are in the care of the local authority are also included in this premium. Children of Service personnel receive a reduced grant. Schools can decide how the Pupil Premium is spent, since they are best placed to assess what additional provision should be made for the individual pupils within their responsibility. In 2014/15, 30 children at Leonard Stanley CE Primary School were eligible for this funding.

RAISE on-line data

RAISE on-line data for 2014/15 highlighted the following areas as strengths for our school:

- KS2 value added in all subjects was broadly average or above for disadvantaged pupils and those who have special educational needs.
- Disadvantaged KS1 pupils had an average point score equal to or above the national score for other pupils in reading and mathematics.
- The proportion of disadvantaged KS2 pupils that attained at least Level 4 was equal to or above the national figure for other pupils in reading, writing and mathematics.
- The proportion of disadvantaged KS1 pupils that attained at least Level 2B was equal to or above the national figure for other pupils in reading and writing.
- The proportion of disadvantaged KS1 pupils that attained at least Level 3 was equal to or above the national figure for other pupils in reading and mathematics.
- The proportion of disadvantaged KS1 pupils that attained at least Level 2B was equal to or above the national figure for other pupils in reading and mathematics.
